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EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

his month's program spotlight is First Start, Summit ESC's preschool autism program.

First Start serves a variety of districts in the greater Summit County area. This program is for students three years old through kindergarten, who could benefit from a smaller, more structured learning environment and a higher adult-to-student ratio for a more specialized system of learning. Each student's participation in the First Start program is determined on a case by case basis and all decisions are made according to data from evaluations, observations and behavioral needs.

The First Start classroom is designed to meet the needs of children who need concentrated academic, social-emotional, communication and/or behavioral interventions. There is a huge emphasis on developing academic, functional and language skills, as well as establishing appropriate play, social skills and interactions with peers. The classroom offers one-to-one intervention, small and large group activities and hands-on teaching lessons.

Heather Brolly, lead teacher of First Start, has a bachelor's degree in early child-hood intervention and a minor in speech pathology and audiology from The University of Akron. She has been teaching for almost eight years, five of them leading First Start.

"It has been so rewarding being a part of this program," said Brolly. "I love being able to help students learn in a way that is specialized for them. Not all students learn the same way or at the same speed, and this program helps that."

Assistant teacher, Kathie Pyanowski, has almost 19 years of teaching experience and has spent four years in the First Start classroom. Emily Johnson, another assistant teacher, is currently earning her degree in early childhood education with a focus on special education and English-Language Learners.

"This program is designed to help non-verbal children with Autism succeed, by discovering ways to help them communicate their needs," said Director of Student Services Kristin Fazio.

Therapies are embedded into the daily schedule and speech therapy is offered in the office two days per week. Students attend First Start four days a week for five and a half hours per day.

FIRST START EXPANSION

This year, First Start has been focusing on increasing the functional communication of the children in the classroom with an emphasis on whether or not they would be good candidates for High Tech speech generating devices (SGDs). The program has access to three SGD devices, lent by FORBES, PRC and Saltillo, to help develop an assessment process to screen, collect student data and test children in the preschool who may benefit from an SGD.

With the proper assessment of children's needs, the hope is that next year community training nights and professional development trainings will be held for all members involved in the development of this program, including parents.

All four of the students who have gone through an SGD assessment have been recommended for a device and the improvements being seen from the trial devices have been incredible.

"Children who have been previously labeled as being non-verbal are now creating speech that previously was not heard," said RyAnn Heller, speech and language pathologist. "Students are now getting both a verbal and visual model for language that is consistent and allows them to express their needs and wants at any time."

The expansion of First Start will benefit the students in helping them to develop their verbal skills through proper identification, assessments and access to the right devices.

STUDENT SERVICES FEATURED CONSULTANT KAY SONODA

ttendance Coordinator Kay Sonoda has been with the Summit ESC since 1995.
Kay's consultant services include helping districts communicate with families to prevent truancy, assisting with the completion of forms and sitting in on attendance intervention teams. In addition, she assists districts in filing complaints with Juvenile Courts, participates in court mediation and represents the districts she serves in court hearings.

With the passage of House Bill 410, Sonoda plays an integral part in helping the districts she serves stay compliant with the law. Schools must now track and report student absences to the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) in school hours missed rather than school days. Tardiness also counts toward a student's overall absence. A student is considered a "habitual truant" under state law, if absent without legitimate excuse 30 or more consecutive hours, 42 or more hours in one month or 72 or more hours in one school year.

Sonoda fully understands the policies and procedures that must be followed and works with districts to ensure they understand them as well.

Sonoda's background is in social work, elementary education and school counseling. Prior to joining the Summit ESC, Sonoda was a social worker for Akron Public Schools and taught second grade. Over the past 22 years, she has worked with over 12 school districts in Summit County.



"House Bill 410 presents a number of changes that must be made to district's attendance policies and procedures," said Sonoda. "I have the knowledge and expertise to help districts put the new truancy law into practice and I look forward to assisting our member districts and their staff."

She also provides common formative assessment (CFA) 2.0 training. Her CFA work prioritizes standards by creating a roadmap that links standards, assessments and instructional practice.

TWO SUMMIT ESC TEAM MEMBERS HAVE ARTICLES FEATURED IN OHIO ASCD JOURNAL

ummit ESC's Director of Student Services Kristin Fazio and former Director of Professional Development N'ecole Ast recently had an article titled, *Self-Monitoring: A Forgotten Tool*, featured in the Ohio Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development (ASCD) Journal.

The article focused on ways to improve student achievement by teaching self-monitoring strategies and having the student play an active role in the education process, as opposed to relying on teacher-led instructional strategies and techniques. While most professional development tends to center around what the teacher says and does, Fazio and Ast focused on the importance of placing emphasis on what the students says and does.

The article references a personal testimony on how introducing the self-monitoring concept within the classroom, quickly led to a complete turnaround for a struggling student.

"Self-monitoring helps a student see their negative behavior and the effect it has on others," said Fazio. "It's an easy way for teachers to help students who present a variety of behavioral challenges. The outcome of introducing the self-monitoring tool in the classroom is truly invaluable for the student and the classroom as a whole."

SUMMIT ESC'S WOMEN'S LEADERSHIP NETWORK BECOMES STATE-WIDE EFFORT

s part of the Lifting Leaders series, Summit ESC's Leadership Services Consultant Dr. Christina Dinklocker and Geauga County ESC Superintendent Jennifer Felker teamed up to launch a Women's Leadership Network in August.

The Women's Leadership Network offers women who wish to pursue a career in a management position or to sharpen their leadership skills an opportunity to meet and network.

The duo shared the concept at the Buckeye Association for School Administrators (BASA) Conference in Columbus in October in an attempt to begin a state-wide effort to offer the networking opportunity throughout Ohio.

Women across the State of Ohio are now teaming up to organize Women's Leadership Networks in each area of the state. Each organized group of women will meet monthly to discuss career opportunities, share resources and learn new skills. In March, the groups will come together in Columbus for an annual Women's Leadership Conference.

Details of the conference have yet to be shared in the coming months.

"This is a great opportunity for women across the State of Ohio," said Dr. Dinklocker. "I encourage all women to attend the network sessions to expand their knowledge and skills to reach their goals."

SST-8 UPDATE

DISTRICTS SUPPORT ACCESS AND EQUITY FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

During the 2017-2018 school year, Portage Lakes Career Center and nine districts are participating in a series entitled "Leading Reform in Least Restrictive Environment Practices" led by State Support Team, Region 8 (SST-8). The participating districts include Barberton City Schools, Copley-Fairlawn City Schools, Kent City Schools, Manchester Local Schools, Medina City Schools, Rootstown Local Schools, Tallmadge City Schools, Wadsworth City Schools and Waterloo Local Schools. An additional 10 districts attended this series last year.

Since the Education for All Handicapped Children Act was passed in 1975, schools have been required to provide children with disabilities with a free appropriate public education (FAPE) in the least restrictive environment (LRE). With the current focus on standards and accountability, a "key aspect in thinking about achievement of students with disabilities is access – access to general education curriculum, access to high quality instruction and access to peers." (Theoharis and Causton, 2014)

Throughout this four-day series, district teams will analyze both school and district level data to determine the current status of student services and student opportunities for learning, facilitate conversations to raise equity awareness within their district and investigate the research of highly effective practices in integrated schools. The teams will then work to draft action steps that will ensure the needs of all students are met appropriately within their buildings.
